
Message from our Chair

2017 Retrospective

In March, we partnered with THUNK Theatre to deliver "Bread School" - an incredibly moving participatory theatre production about neighbourhood

In **April** we launched the second phase of Growing Futures at the Innovation Centre. Mayor Jim Watson, Kitchissippi Ward Councillor Jeff Leiper, partners from the community, and 120 budding young entrepreneurs helped us celebrate.

In May we were incredibly honoured to receive the United Way Community Builder Award for: From Poverty to Possibility. We brought over 30 kids from Growing Futures and Thirteen to accept the award with us at the Shaw Centre.

In **June**, we participated in TROPHY, sharing stories about moments in our lives where everything changed in a magical setting of pop-up tents in the Byward Market.

In **July**, we hosted the Chefs des Chefs Club, the personal chefs of twenty heads of state from around the Globe and shared the kitchen using Thirteen's spices to cook up a storm.

In **August,** we received proceeds from Canada's Table, an open-air dinner for 1,000 people on Wellington street, and hosted our own community meal prepared by top chefs from across the country.

In **October**, we celebrated an amazing achievement: we reached #100neighboursstrong! Now more than 100 individuals are supporting our work through their monthly donations.

In **December**, we had a ton of fun hosting CBC's Project Give in support of the Ottawa Food Bank and were honoured to received Canada's Volunteer Award for Social Innovation from Minister Yves Duclos.




Good Food for All

In 2017, our food bank provided healthy groceries to 1831 individuals in 953 households. 1 in 4 were children. We know that not all residents of Ottawa have access to healthy emergency food, that's why we accepted 57 reference letters from healthcare practitioners in 2017 to allow neighbours from across the City to access our food bank from outside our catchment, helping to create more equitable access while advocating for the importance of good food for all.

In addition to providing healthy food through our food bank, community fridge and multiple cooking programs, we have placed a new emphasis in 2017 on fostering a more resilient and engaged generation. In 2017, we hosted over 300 students through our weekly Solutionary Workshops.

Together we tackled big issues of poverty, food justice, social determinants of health and activism. These kids will grow up solutionaries - understanding how their communities contribute to the health and well-being of their neighbours, and ready to take action to create to a better and brighter future.



Growing Futures

The second phase of Growing Futures was officially launched in April of 2017 and the social enterprise has been growing all over the city ever since! On the launch day, the Mayor was so enthused by seeing everyone come together - our youth, our Sponsors, our Business Partners and our community as a whole - that he committed to sponsoring 5 towers right then and there. That propelled our growth into new spaces and created new relationships outside of schools. Our Greenilicious smoothies made a debut in July and the blender bike continues to be a popular feature at markets and shows. We're reaching more children and youth than ever and are excited by the impact we are having in the community. Our goal to build health, resilience, practical skills and community connections is being realized everyday!

Thirteen: A Social Enterprise

2017 was a spicy year for our youth social enterprise! Wanting to share our diverse traditions, we introduced into the market spice mixes from some of our cultural backgrounds. They have been so successful that we have now begun calling ourselves Thirteen Spices.

We had an eventful spring and summer. Fatouma represented us on a youth panel at the National Canadian Agriculture day, speaking about the importance of youth in agriculture and why we need to know where your food comes from. We also hosted the prestigious Chefs des Chefs Club - the personal chefs of heads of states from around the globe! In July, the second year cohort graduated from the program and were handed their certificates by City Councillor Jeff Leiper, MPP Yasir Naqvi and MP Catherine McKenna.

In September, our 3rd cohort launched: another eleven youth from diverse backgrounds, with their own unique stories. We also welcomed our new Team Lead, Meagan McVeigh! After a week of intensive business training, we met with business owners, the city council and several entrepreneurs.



Funding our Future

Our 4th annual gala, held on June 1st, 2017 at the GCTC raised over \$23,000 in an event made possible by the numerous sponsors and businesses whose contributions made for a evening to remember.

The other important component of our fundraising efforts are community-driven events. From the Brewery Markets, to Maker House's generous monthly contribution, to the ongoing dinners at Petit Bill's, the listening club at the Wellington Gastropub, and many more.... So many local businesses are supporting our work and in doing so are helping to build a resilient neighbourhood.


We were thrilled by the community rallying around our #100NEIGHBOURSSTRONG campaign to build our monthly donations and want to extend a specials thanks everyone who helped us get there. Beginning 2017 with 40 monthly donors, we finished the year with 125! 






The Numbers





The City of Ottawa is our single largest supporter accounting for 12% of our funding while all grant sources total 25%. Donated food, primarily from the Ottawa Food Bank, local businesses and food drives, represents 22% of our support. Public support and donations, account for 42%. Our social enterprise Growing Futures received 11% of our 2017 funding.

Purchased and donated food accounted for 37% of what we delivered to our neighbours as emergency food, cooking workshop and community meals. Most of the remaining expenditures are related to the support of programs and general operations and is 48% of our total expenditures (this includes rent and staff salaries).
